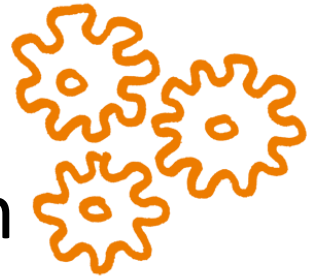

Shareyourpaper.org automates repository deposit workflows for journal articles — metadata entry, permissions, and version checking. Repository managers can use this self-setup system and adjust the workflow to their liking. In this webinar (55 minutes) Joe McArthur, OA.Works Director, explains different options and set-up processes for each one of them in a live demo.

Quick and easy setup process:

Step 1: Go to <https://openaccessbutton.org/shareyourpaper/setup#> and click Deposit Preferences, make sure that you are logged in, add your repository name, repository policy URL, a short description of your deposit process, answer some more questions about the set up, click Save & Continue.

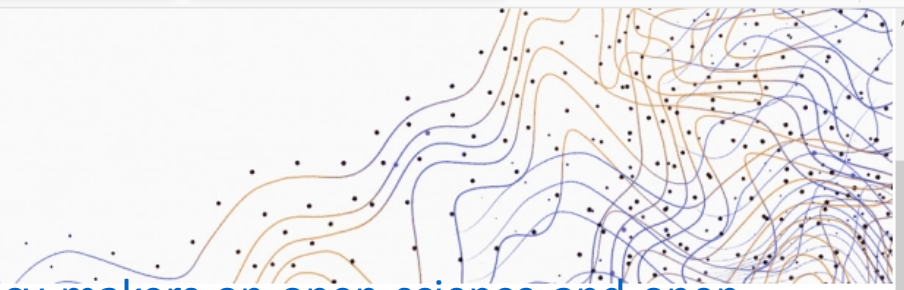
Step 2: Add your [Open Access Policy](#) if you have one.

Step 3: Click [Repository](#) and select how you would like to get deposits in your repository: [Manual repository deposit: one-by-one over email](#), [Manually: bulk upload spreadsheet](#), [Programmatically: OAI-PMH](#), [Programmatically: API](#) or [Programmatically: Direct Deposit](#). All these options are explained in the webinar.

Step 4: Integrate Shareyourpaper.org onto any webpage on your website, and blend in with your brand - copy and paste the source code (HTML) from a box (or ask a developer to).

This is an updated version of the EIFL Digital Research Literacy Training Programme Outline for Librarians, first published in November 2020. We have added new resources to the training programme outline, including recordings and slides from a series of webinars (2021) that provided practical advice, ideas and tips for librarians who conduct digital research literacy training for students and researchers.

Digital research literacy comprises the skills, knowledge and understanding required to produce quality research outputs in a digital environment. Libraries offer a variety of training programmes for faculty and students; however, an EIFL survey conducted in 2018 across 36 EIFL partner countries found that the only two topics well familiar to librarians were 'Research process' and 'Writing articles and reusing content'. All other digital research literacy topics remained largely undiscovered.

To enable university and research libraries to help researchers and students produce quality research outputs, EIFL compiled this digital research literacy training programme outline. The training outline is organized according to the research cycle: Discover, Manage Research Data, Publish, Disseminate and Increase Visibility, and Measure Impact. Each section gives an overview of the topic, what the trainer should cover, and what

the learner should gain by the end of the training. Each topic includes 'Resources for facilitators and learners', with useful material that trainers and learners can use to improve their own knowledge or use in their own training.

The Community of Practice for Training Coordinators (CoP) is an informal network to share training experiences initiated by a group of people who coordinate training programmes of research and e-infrastructures. This initiative of starting a Community of Practice for training coordinators aims to map out the training activities of various pan-European, EOSC-related initiatives and strengthen their training capacity by improved alignment, sharing experiences and good practices, initiating cross-infrastructure training activities.

Background: One of the outcomes of the EUDAT project final conference was to set up several training workshops across Europe. At the EUDAT end conference the team, including OpenAIRE, proposed to continue collaboration, independent of projects, in a bottom up initiative for a Community of Practice for training coordinators. The idea was welcomed at the education and training group of the RDA and OpenAIRE has taken up coordination activities.

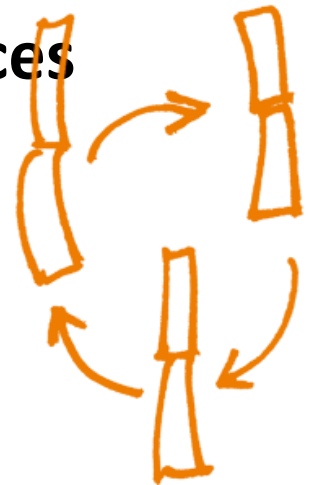

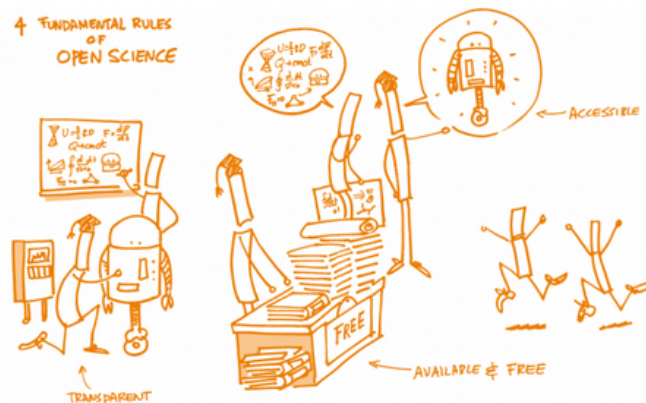

EIFL and our partner library consortia - the Consortium of Ethiopian Academic and Research Libraries ([CEARL](#)), Kenya Libraries and Information Services Consortium ([KLISC](#)) and the Consortium of Uganda University Libraries ([CUUL](#)) - have launched a new project to boost open access and open science policy development, and improve repositories and training.

Titled, 'Institutional and national open access and open science roadmaps and training in Ethiopia, Kenya and Uganda', the project is funded by SPIDER, The Swedish Program for ICT in Developing Regions, located at DSV, Department of Computer and System Sciences, which is a part of Stockholm

University.

ETHIOPIA: OPEN SCIENCE TRAINING FOR RESEARCHERS & PHD STUDENTS

In Ethiopia, CEARL will create open reusable training modules, on open access, research data management and open science, that can be used for self-learning and facilitated training.

CEARL will also organize two-day training programmes for researchers and PhD students in four public universities: two in Addis Ababa, the capital city - Addis Ababa University and Kotebe Metropolitan University - and two universities outside the capital that still need to be identified. The aim is to develop a training programme that can be replicated by other institutions in Ethiopia in future.

KENYA: INSTITUTIONAL REPOSITORY ENHANCEMENTS AND OPEN ACCESS POLICIES

In Kenya, KLISC will organize institutional repository development and open access policy and advocacy workshops for research managers and librarians in five KLISC institutions: Amref International University, University of Kabianga, Alupe University College, Nyeri Laikipia University and Chuka University. Five institutional repositories will be improved and five institutional open access policies will be drafted.

UGANDA: NATIONAL OPEN SCIENCE SYMPOSIUM AND INFRASTRUCTURE REQUIREMENTS

In Uganda, CUUL will host a national Open Science Symposium and compile a national open science infrastructure inventory of needs and requirements. Open science policy and Data Management Plan (DMP) templates will be drafted and discussed, a checklist for open science workshop/s created, and a national Open Science Roadmap with recommendations for open science practice in Uganda will be released. A national Open Science Committee will be launched with a call for action on open science and a national policy.

UNESCO Recommendation on Open Science

At the [40th session of UNESCO's General Conference](#), 193 Member States tasked the Organization with the development of an international standard-setting instrument on Open Science in the form of a UNESCO Recommendation on Open Science to be adopted by Member States in 2021.

The Recommendation is expected to define shared values and principles for Open Science, and identify concrete measures on Open Access and Open Data, with proposals to bring citizens closer to science and commitments to facilitate the production and dissemination of scientific knowledge around the world. The Recommendation will be developed through a regionally balanced, multistakeholder, inclusive and transparent consultation process.

UNESCO Recommendation on Open Science will complement the 2017 Recommendation on Science and Scientific Research. It will also build upon the UNESCO Strategy on Open Access to Scientific Information and Research and the new UNESCO Recommendation on Open Educational Resources.

UNESCO Recommendations are legal instruments in which "the General Conference formulates principles and norms for the international regulation of any particular question and invites Member States to take whatever legislative or other steps may be required in conformity with the constitutional practice of each State and the nature of the question under consideration to apply the principles and norms aforesaid within their respective territories". Emanating from the Organization's supreme governing body and hence possessing great authority, recommendations are intended to influence the development of national laws and practices.

Draft text of the UNESCO Recommendation on Open Science

Following the consensus reached during the [intergovernmental meeting of experts](#) held from 6 to 11 May 2021, the Draft text of the Recommendation will be put forward for adoption by UNESCO's General Conference during its next session in November 2021:
